One More Spring Plant Sale

(milkweed) species, golden alexander (*Zizia aurea*), and passion vine (*Passiflora incarnata*). Plants are moved to a shady area, once they are upsized. Among the species blooming now in her garden are blanket flower (*Gaillardia pulchella*), tickseed (*Coreopsis lanceolata*), and in the background red columbine (*Aquilegia canadensis*) and coral honeysuckle (*Lonicera sempervirens*). Many more species will be in bloom during summer and fall, most importantly milkweed (*Asclepias*) species. Mary Beth is Chair of Monarchs Across Georgia.

Plant Rescue Scheduled for Berrien County

There will be a plant rescue in Berrien County on **Sun., June 11**, from 9:00 a.m. - noon, led by Amy Heidt and Heather Brasell. **Pre-registration is required**. Among the species identified for rescue are *Cyrilla racemiflora*, summer titi; *Euthamia graminifolia*, flat-top goldenrod; *Hypericum crux-andrea*, St. Andrew's cross; *Hypericum sp.*, St. John's wort; *Ilex coriacea*, largeleaf gallberry; Ilex glabra, gallberry; *Liatris microcephala*, small-head blazing star; *Lyonia ferruginea*, rusty lyonia; *Osmanthus Americana*, American olive; *Pityopsis graminifolia*, silver leaf aster; *Rhodendron canescens*, piedmont azalea; *Rhus copallinum*, winged sumac; *Serenoa repens*, horse sugar; *Smilax pumila*, sarsaparilla vine (smilax – thornless); *Vacccinium arboretum*, sparkleberry; *Vacccinium elliotii*, Elliot's blueberry; and *Vacccinium myrsinites*, shiny blueberry. UGA Tifton Student Intern learns via CPC Propagation

The following article has been contributed by Kaleb Bell of Nashville, Ga, who completed an independent study in greenhouse management in cooperation with the Coastal Plain Chapter. Kaleb has also been serving as an after-school instructor in agriculture and environmental concepts at the Berrien County Elementary School. His next step is to begin student teaching and searching for a full-time career in agricultural education. He was honored at the Rosalynn Carter Butterfly Symposium as the recipient of Garden Club of Georgia (and National Garden Club) scholarships throughout his college career.

Agricultural Education major Kaleb Bell has had the opportunity to partner with the Coastal Plains Chapter of the Georgia Native Plant Society while completing an independent study this semester. As part of his study, Kaleb has been growing native plant species, including members of the aster family like Mikania scandens, as well as a variety of native hibiscus varieties using

the green house facilities on the UGA Tifton Campus.

Kaleb has also met with the Coastal Plains chapter members to help manage their nursery while learning first-hand about the growing habits of native plants.

"It's truly been an honor," Kaleb said, when asked about the work he's been doing with the Native Plant Society, "I never would have imagined the diversity of plants here in our backyards. Plants that most of us may consider weeds are actually key parts of our regional ecosystem-with many of them serving as breeding grounds or food sources for our pollinators." In addition to working in the chapter's nursery, Kaleb has put his feet to the ground, assisting chapter members with plant reintroduction efforts. Most recently, Kaleb accompanied several members of the chapter as they reintroduced over 120 protected pitcher plants in a regional state park. "It's really rewarding to have been part of something larger than myself and my studies. Now I can go back to that park, make my way to the bogs, and see the effort that we put forth to ensure these plants have a home." As he continues his study, Kaleb is planning to attend outreach events with the chapter. As for the plants he's been growing in the Tifton greenhousethose will be given away as gifts to attendees at these events. A true educator, Kaleb say's his main hope is to impact the lives of others, stating "It's important that people recognize the beauty of our environment here at home. If one person is impacted by taking home and rearing a native plant that I watched grow from seed, I'll be proud of the work we've done thus far."
